The Minnesota School of Botanical Art Watercolor Materials List

Watercolors: One tube each, Daniel Smith brand:

Lemon Yellow (cool)

Cadmium Yellow Deep Hue (warm)

Ultramarine Blue (cool)

Cerulean Blue – NOT Cerulean Blue Chromium (warm)

Permanent Alizarin Crimson (cool) Cadmium Red Medium Hue (warm)

Imperial Purple

(Please note: if you already have watercolors bring them and we will try to make them work.)

Round Brushes: Size 2 or 3, Raphael, Series 8404, OR Winsor Newton Series 7, sable brushes

May substitute with a Princeton Velvet Touch, Size 4 Round, synthetic brush

Princeton Velvet Touch, Flat Shader, Size 10 (for mixing colors)

(Please note: Several sable brushes are in short supply so you may substitute with the Princeton brands. If you find the Raphael or Winsor Newton Series 7 brushes, they are the best.

Papers: 1 sheet 22 x 30" 140 lb. hot press Arches watercolor paper, cut in quarters

(Note: Arches blocs of hot press 140 lb. watercolor paper do not have as good a surface as their

22 x 30" sheets that are sold individually.) Scrap watercolor paper for testing colors

Tracing Paper

Other Drawing paper and paper for notes and sketches

Pencils: (for example F, 2H, 4H, 2B)

Kneaded Eraser

*Foam board "book" for backdrop

Small white plastic palette for mixing colors, 10 wells. (This is a must!)

Lid for white plastic palette or plastic bag to protect paints White 6" porcelain/china dinner plate (used for dry brush)

Artist's low-tack tape

Paper Towels 12" ruler

2 small containers for water (single serve yogurt containers work)

Optional: Winsor Newton Masking Fluid

Hunt Globe 513EF nib and nib pen holder

Local Art Stores: Wet Paint, St. Paul 651/698-6431

Artworks, Excelsior 952/474-5000

*Foam board "book": Cut two pieces of ¼" foam core, approximately 12" wide x 17" high. Tape one long edge of the two boards together on the 17" side with masking tape. This will form a book. You will use this as a backdrop for your plant specimens.
